

4 decades of programmes





With songs from Abiyoyo to Zum Gali Gali, children taking part in Festival of Voices concerts across the last forty years have sung almost 400 songs collectively.

Songs have been extremely wide-ranging in style and subject matter with music from around the world stimulating our young people's interest including folksongs and spirituals, gospel favourities and sea shanties.

World in Union (Skarbek/Holst), an ever-present since the Rugby World Cup of 1992, has been the most used song, closely followed by Lin Marsh's *Believe* and *Somewhere Out There* (Horner/Mann/Weil).

Some of the most enjoyed songs have been from the treasury of song in the music industry: film, theatre, shows etc. We have embraced many different languages, the music of contemporary songwriters as well as pop songs from the 1950s to the present day; and the children have loved singing about animals. To date it is 24 different creatures including an *Inchworm, Rubber Duckie* and even a *Purple People Eater!*

The Band

KEVIN STANNARD conductor Monday - Tuesday - Friday

Kevin is very proud to have been associated with the Festival of Voices since the 1980s; he has conducted FoV concerts at the Wembley Conference Centre, the Fairfield Halls in Croydon, St Andrew's Hall in Norwich and Dorchester Abbey. He taught music in Oxfordshire schools for 10 years before moving to lecture at the University of Wolverhampton from 1995-2019 followed by a very enjoyable spell as Choir Master at Oundle School.

Kevin is currently a Music Engagement Officer for the Heart of England Music Hub which involves teaching piano and singing and running the choirs at Blue Coat School Coventry.

Kevin has compiled three songbooks for children published by Oxford University Press and his current work, involving children's cantatas co-written with Rebecca Thompson can be found at: www.Jacobsladderproductions.co.uk; their 'Creature Cantata III' was recently performed at Coventry's Albany Theatre. He has also co-written 'The Lady Godiva Musical' with Aaron Ashmore which is to be performed outdoors in Coventry's Broadgate Square. At the moment he is writing the incidental music for a play: 'The French Lieutenant's Woman' to be performed in the Marine Theatre, Lyme Regis in 2026.

Kevin also directs the Berkswell Church choir, the Uniting Singers in Solihull, the Leamington Spa Chorale and the Stoneleigh Male Voice Choir.

PETER HUNT conductor Wednesday (both concerts) - Thursday

Peter has enjoyed conducting Festival of Voices for twenty-eight years. After an extensive career in secondary schools and music education, mostly in Oxfordshire, he retired from the Music Hub for Berkshire, having been Head of Voice and Deputy Head. He now lives in Devon but maintains connections with Oxfordshire.

He is nationally known and respected for the inspirational **Voiceworks series** of books published by OUP, which are helping teachers to gain confidence and transform their children's singing abilities around the world. His new book of singing rounds - **SingCircle** - was published last August.

Peter is still an active singer, and has just finished his second season as Musical Director of Exeter Choral Society. This autumn sees the fourth annual chamber choir SingCircle Weekend at Dartington Hall in Devon which he runs with a colleague. In addition to still enjoying a paddle about on the River Dart, he is exploring further wonders of Dartmoor and showing more interest in walking the South West coast path.

AMY MALKIN violin

Amy started playing the violin when she was seven. She has sung in choirs from an early age at school, college and university.

She has been playing in the band for the Festival of Voices for over 20 years now. And each time is just as much fun and special as the last.

Amy is currently loving life, making and selling her own natural skincare products under the name "From Bee to You Balms". She remains a busy mum of two and the proud doggy Mum of "Strider"

She hopes the music lifts our spirits and brings the joy we feel each year.

ANNA KEEN bass

Anna has been involved in the Festival of Voices for more years than there are frets on a bass guitar, first singing in the choir while her dad was the drummer in the original band; then, at the age of 14, joining him in the band as bass player for the National Festival of Voices in London, before also becoming involved in the Oxfordshire festival, which she has been delighted to play for ever since. When not playing bass, Anna is a full time gardener, and occasional artist.

JAMES GAFFORD drums

James began his music education at Chipping Norton School, before going on to study percussion and music performance at the Academy of Contemporary Music in Guildford, Surrey.

He has recorded and performed with different artists of varying styles, and enjoys playing with his band. The Reprobeats around Hampshire, West Sussex and Surrey.

ANDREW McKENNA piano

Andrew hails from Toronto, with a B.Mus degree from University of Toronto and a Diploma in Piano Performance from the Royal Conservatory of Music.

He is now based in Wokingham and has been providing scores, arrangements and orchestrations for a wide range of international clients since 1995. Past projects have included work on films such as Persuasion, Judy, and Bohemian Rhapsody, along with arranging work for Explora Cruise Lines and composition and sound design work for LEGOLAND Parks. He teaches Composition and Music Technology at A Level at Luckley House School, and also regularly accompanies the Berkshire Youth Choir....and really enjoys returning to the Oxfordshire Festival of Voices each year!

years of the band

The inaugural Festival of Voices band was formed in 1984 by Jeremy Rowe (conductor), Val Scarff (piano) and Tony Keen (drum kit) and this team, joined on bass by Alistair Smith in 1989, shaped the band in its early years.

Kevin Stannard took over the baton in 1991 having brought pupils from the Isis Middle School, Oxford to sing in the late '80s and Peter Hunt came on board in 1996, to share the conducting responsibilities.

In the '90s there was a wonderful group of students from Oxford's Cherwell School, including Michael Simpson (piano/percussion), Daniel Francis (trumpet), Edwin Scroggie (drum kit), Marcus Moss (bass), Kirsty Wood (trumpet), Kellie Crothers (soprano/clarinet) and Tom Poster (piano) - several of whom are now leading figures in the professional world of entertainment and education. How lucky we were to procure the skills of these young people!

Undergraduate musicians from the University of Wolverhampton Music Department featured strongly in the 00s, notably Jenny Hancox (piano), Gemma Wilkinson (clarinet) and Amy Malkin (violin) who is still going strong! The band currently features Anna Keen (bass) who remarkably first appeared in 2000 and James Gafford (drum kit) in 2002; the addition of Andrew McKenna (piano/arranging) in 2009 completes the line-up as we know it today. What fabulous experiences these musicians bring to the 40th birthday party!

The commitment of our band of musicians has been remarkable over the years providing a solid foundation for singing and supporting musical fluency and continuity in each performance. There have been many other musicians who have made important contributions to the band, mostly young people, including all three of Kevin's children (Madeleine, Laurence and Niall) and the following who have all played twice or more: Clive Burn, James Church, Sally Goodworth and Tim Smith (piano), William Robinson (drum kit) and Simon Finney (trumpet).

I have the very happiest memories of being the pianist in the band for Oxfordshire Festival of Voices. It was such a thrill to be part of this joyful, massed celebration of music, and a lot of the songs we played/sang have been earworms ever since! I still try to find as much joy in my music-making as I can (I'm a professional concert pianist these days, as well as a composer and arranger), and have always drawn a lot of inspiration from these early and formative musical memories. 'Somewhere Out There' was always the penultimate song in FOV (before 'World in Union'), and it has remained a favourite ever since!

I always used to feel excited when we got the new song books for that year, to see what we were going to sing. I especially loved learning Thank You for the Music by Abba. It was always fun rehearsing.

Clara, 2009 - 2012 I played a bassoon solo and sang in a girl band. Such a cool opportunity to play to a huge audience and all the other choirs.

I remember the excitement of filing in, seeing it fill up around us with children from other schools, and then being struck by the amazing amount of sound when everyone started singing together.

Then it was lovely to be asked back a few years later to play the Arutunian Trumpet Concerto as part of the programme in Dorchester Abbey.

The Festival of Voices was a very memorable and very exciting part of my primary school experience.
