The big event this term was this year's NAPE conference, CURRICULUM AT THE CROSSROADS: TIME FOR AN IMAGINATIVE LEAP? held at Leeds Trinity University on Wednesday 12 March. The conference theme was selected as a response to the current Curriculum and Assessment Review initiated by the new government. There were three key inputs, two from members of the University team and the third was given by Prof. Mick Waters, our recently appointed NAPE President and former QCA Director of Curriculum.

Professor Leigh Hoath explored how the curriculum can be developed and implemented so that children are equipped with the skills and knowledge to address environmental concerns and take climate action

**Dr Aimee Quickfall** shared some insights from her experience and research on using philosophical inquiry in Primary and Early Years, with a focus on how philosophising can both enhance and underpin the curriculum and help to foster a love of learning as a community.

NAPE President, Professor Mick Waters drew on his exceptional experience of the primary sector to address the conference

theme, sharing some visual images of education at its most challenging and imaginative and reflecting on future directions for the primary curriculum.
